BY SPENDING TIME

Family Day celebration has been a tradition for our Pag-asa families! On its 7th year, our Family Day program continues to help.Pag-asa children develop a sense of identity and belonging as we institute new customary practices and carry on old ones. On Family Day, they turn off the TV, ignore the phone and just spend quality time together. This allows them to feel secure, to feel loved, and to bond with each other.

Every year, Family Day becomes an occasion to cherish the precious yet little time we have with our families. The years will fly by. The older our children get, the

less time there will be for us to spend with them, given our busy work and school schedules. Spending time together, by engaging in a conversation, doing simple daily activities such as sharing a meal, or enjoying fun activities—is the best way that Pag-asa knows to give its children the tools of life which they will need-as they grow up and when they will start their own families.



BY GIVING A TREAT

Gen Rosso, the Focolare Movement's international performing arts group of musicians, dancers and actors, has been traveling to promote understanding among nations, solidarity, and a spirit of brother and sisterhood for more than 40 years.

For the first time, they performed their



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musical concert entitled "Streetlight" here in the Philippines. The concert has been an ideal vehicle for reaching young people, and the emotional appeal comes with their style of music and dance, and it did reach all our high school and college students who were there to experience the spectacle. After the show, our highschoolers remarked that they had acquired an inner strength of their own, and they had discovered things they can do to counteract a subliminally aggressive atmosphere in the classroom and among their friends. The show encouraged them to solve conflicts in their immediate surroundings.

Our group, Teatro.Pag-asa, on the other hand, enjoyed watching a musical concert of the United Nations Singers. It was a chance as well for our Teatro members to observe and learn some points in singing and acting.

United Nations Singers came to the Philippines for the first time, Gen Rosso for the second time, and both did a series of musical concerts. The proceeds were sent to the victims of Haiyan typhoon which severely devastated the southern Philippines in November of last year.



BY GIVING A LIVELIHOOD

Having been blessed with some staff members who happen to be gastronomes and who have mastered their culinary skills through time, we have always been commended for the dishes we prepare for special occasions. Many who had tasted our dishes, encouraged us for quite a number of years to venture into catering.





Finally, we decided to make it a livelihood and thus give jobs to mothers who cook well and love to cook, too. We named our catering service "haPag" (which means dining table), also carrying the prefix "Pag" the name "Pag-asa". It was launched in February as we cooked a week's meal for the visiting Gen Rosso Band members who all enjoyed the variety of both local and international food served to them.

Another livelihood project designed to help more children and families, is the newly launched PAG-ASA ONE FAMILY MULTI-PURPOSE COOPERATIVE! We envision that with the cooperative, our families enjoy the fruits of their labor at the same time it helps them and their family members to better their lives in the long run.

As for one of our existing livelihood project: the Favola T-shirt printing, we partnered with Starkmacher e.V., an international organization as well as with six European and non-European countries. Through





Starkmacher e.V. we participated in the project: "Young People's Business" which refers to a wider project aimed at creating a network between different civil society associations worldwide that work with young people, and young entrepreneurs growing their own business ideas. It is a project supported by the European Union. Part of the one-year-project was

an international workshop organized by the Associazione Culturale Modo, with the patronage of the city of Udine, Italy. Three of our youth working in Favola, and its endorser, local actor Hero Angeles, joined thirty other youth participants from different countries.

From design to fashion, graphics and communication crafts, etc., this project is designed for those who want to make innovative entrepreneurship. But more than doing business from creative ideas, the heart of this project is to have a fruitful collaboration between experts, entrepreneurs, and teachers from different countries.

BY FEEDING

It's already the third year that the British School Manila, as part of their Creativity Action Service Program (CAS Program), joined our Saturday Activities. The boys enjoyed playing at our Sala Leo with our basketball team, while the girls shared talents with our theater group. Some of them also visited a few households who are still without electricity connection yet. They distributed - together with the Empowering Brilliant Minds Foundation, Inc. (EBM) and the One Million Lights Foundation - 30 solar-powered lights! They also fed 190 of our children with snack and lunch, which they themselves prepared together with haPag. Driven by the desire to help long



RYONAN Electric Philippines Corporation came for the second time, offered 175 snacks to our children.

For 5 years now, the **Benedictine** sisters of St. Scholastica's House of Spirituality in Tagaytay offered 150 snacks, by giving up their meal budget in observance of the Lenten fast.

term, they funded the lunch feeding of 50 children studying in our Daycare Center for the entire year, starting last month.

BY GIVING EDUCATION

With the increasing number of aspiring college students, we have partnered with Dualtech Training Center Foundation,

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Inc. (DTCFI), a not-for-profit, technicalvocational school preparing young people for employment in industrial firms. Through the Dual Training System, the school collaborates with several business entities to impart relevant skills and values to high school graduates. The school welcomes individuals and groups who wish to contribute to poverty alleviation through technical skills training. We sent 9 of our students for a free two-year college course.

After introducing the Alternative Learning System (ALS)*, out-of-school youths, nonreaders, working Filipinos and even senior citizens, are going back to school! Many of our parent-members took advantage of this opportunity. Maricon Eliazar, who has still three school children, went back to school after 24 years. She went to school at her preferred schedule, allowing her to continue working for a living. Her hard work and dedication paid off: To her, her family and community's joy, she graduated valedictorian.

*(The ALS is a ladderized, modular non-formal education program in the Philippines, for dropouts in elementary and secondary schools. It is part of the education system of the Philippines but an alternative to the regular classroom
